A call from Stockholm...

Transforming the world in an era of global change

Climate change, decreasing biodiversity, deteriorating ecosystems, poverty and a continuously growing population all contribute to reducing the planet's resilience and may have catastrophic implications for humanity.

Each of these problems has attracted great attention from the international community, but they have invariably been considered in isolation, with little or no regard to the interactions between them.

It is time to change this approach.

3rd Nobel Laureate Symposium on Global Sustainability, Stockholm, May 2011

The Symposium will focus on the need for integrated approaches that deal with the synergies, conflicts and trade-offs between the individual components of climate change.

It will gather some 40 of the world's most renowned thinkers and experts on global sustainability – half of them Nobel Laureates – to discuss innovative approaches to the way we manage the world's social and ecological systems.

The Symposium, that will be concluded by a Royal dinner hosted by HM King Carl XVI Gustaf of Sweden, will provide an informal setting for productive discussions on how we can transform current governance into a more sustainable and adaptive management approach that operates within the boundaries of the planet.

The Symposia series

In 2007 the First Nobel Laureate Symposium on Global Sustainability entitled 'Global Sustainability: a Nobel Cause' was held in Potsdam, Germany, and convened by the Potsdam Institute for Climate Impact Research (PIK).

"Global change is one of the greatest challenges facing humanity in the twenty-first century" Angela Merkel, Federal Chancellor of Germany, at the first Nobel Laureate Symposium in Potsdam, 2007.

Two years later it was followed by the 'St. James's Palace Symposium: – the Fierce Urgency of Now' in London under the auspices of HRH The Prince of Wales. The Nobel Laureate Symposia on Global Sustainability have attracted much attention around the world and have significantly advanced our understanding of the magnitude and complexity of the challenges humanity faces in global sustainability.

Symposium themes

The Symposium discussions will be concentrated to three themes – all participants will take part in all three. Three working groups will be created to support these themes. Prior to the Symposium, the working groups will produce reports that will be distributed to the participants beforehand and synthesised into a first version of a Symposium Memorandum.

1. Ecosystems and Human Development

The first theme focuses on the role of ecosystems and the services they provide as the basis for societal development and human well-being.

Chair: Professor Carl Folke, Stockholm Resilience Centre, The Beijer Institute of Ecological Economics

2. The Human Dominated Planet: Where are the Boundaries?

This theme focuses on the great acceleration of human enterprise and on the recent scientific attempts to identify the safe operating space for the ability of planet Earth to support human development as we know it.

Chair: Professor Will Steffen, The Climate Change Institute at the Australian National University

3. Tipping towards sustainability: The great transformation towards sustainable development The third theme will explore the links between crisis, opportunity and innovation for creating radical shifts and large-scale transformations towards sustainability.

Chair: Professor Frances Westley, Waterloo University, Canada.

Key outcomes

The symposium will conclude with a memorandum signed by key Nobel Laureates. This will be communicated and handed over to the High-level Panel on Global Sustainability appointed by the UN Secretary General to reflect on and formulate a new vision for sustainable development and prosperity, along with mechanisms for achieving this vision. The conclusions of the Panel will feed into the preparations for the 2012 UN Conference on Sustainable Development in Rio de Janeiro and into the ongoing climate negotiations.

Furhermore, a special issue of a scientific journal will summarize key discussions from the Symposium.

A public and webcasted event is also planned for 19 May in conjunction with the Symposium. In this, a handful of the researchers and policy-makers will give presentations related to the themes of the symposium.



Scientists from different fields will meet leaders from society and business. In Stockholm the discussions will be divided into three themes – as in Potsdam we want to create opportunities for important informal dialogues.
